THE FOUR WAY TEST

Rotarians strive to apply the following test to the things they think, say or do:

1. Is it the TRUTH?
2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?
3. Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
4. Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?

Background

The Four Way Test was developed by Herbert J Taylor in July 1932 to be used as a measuring stick of the ethics of a Company for which he was working. Herbert Taylor was a Rotarian and a President of Rotary International in 1954 - 1955.

For many decades Rotary Clubs and Rotarians have used the Four Way Test as an instrument to develop respect and understanding. The Four Way Test has also been used successfully around the world in business, government and schools as an effective measuring stick of conduct and a guide to 'right thinking'.

OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular to encourage and foster:

FIRST The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

SECOND High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

ANNUAL REPORTS

CLUB PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2020 - 2021

This has been a very different Rotary year for us all, with limited activities, reduced attendance at dinner meetings and less physical interaction with our community. Covid 19 was a constant source of concern with many public events cancelled and therefore our service/fund raising opportunities severely curtailed. We were able to have two major functions in 2020, the Changeover in July and the DG's visit in October. Both events were held at the RSM and gave us the chance to gather, catch up and enjoy some fellowship. On those evenings we also presented two Paul Harris Fellowships and inducted two new members. Dinner meetings eventually resumed as "normally" as possible and we are grateful to our host at the Tatt's Hotel, Scott Williams (now a member) for the thoughtful, caring and professional way he monitored and implemented Covid protocols to ensure the health and safety of our members.

The new year began with a flurry of hands-on community service activities involving outdoor work. Community Service Director John Scoble, in liaison with the Inverell Shire Council, organised working bees at May St Park and the Cycle Track at Lake Inverell. The latter is a new project of beautification and landscaping and we had excellent support from our friends in Apex and at Danthonia. Sadly, this year we lost a great supporter and friend in Ian Spalding. Spag played an integral role in enabling us to contribute to Council projects. Unfortunately, the year has passed without us being able to organize and run traditional Inverell East events such as the River Run, the Duck Race and Inverell's Got Talent. Hopefully during Larry's presidency, we'll resurrect these popular community activities.

A huge positive in the last twelve months has been the success of our membership team led by Ken Mason. In 2020 we welcomed back Amie Kadano and inducted Scott Williams and David Rose. In 2021 we've "rebadged" former Rotarian Bob Lea and inducted Amy Rawson and Stewart Hill. We've lost a couple of members through ill health or professional demands but have certainly retained our goal of having a diverse, energetic and vibrant club. Another plus has been Treasurer Barry's successful introduction of a card reader to facilitate monetary transactions. We've drawn confidently on our own members to fill some of these "guest spots" and demonstrated just how much ability and talent our club harbours. The regular dinner meetings and community service projects are the life-blood of our club and it has been rewarding to witness the energy and enthusiasm winning through. Youth Director Julie has ensured that programs such as NYSF stay firmly as part of our club culture and Foundation/International director Tim has maintained our awareness of the need to promote and support RAWCS, Rotary Health and the Foundation generally. We remain a Shelter Box club and regularly confer Paul Harris Fellowships.

My thanks to the Board for their unfailing support and encouragement. Our succession planning will ensure that Larry's year as President will be equally well supported. Our club could not have functioned without the commitment and efficiency of Executive Secretary Richard, Secretary Dave and Treasurer Barry. Thank you, gentlemen. Best wishes to incoming President Larry and his Board for the 2021-22 year. May the Rotary Club of Inverell East continue to serve for another 50 years. Happy Golden Anniversary.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Like all other organizations COVID did not do our club any favours.

Many of our usual events that included fund raising had to be cancelled. One of the events that was cancelled was Inverell's Got Talent. A decision has been made to run this event in October. Other events affected being the River Run, Venetian Carnival, Holy Trinity Fair, Inverell Sapphire Festival Parade and Duck Race. Unfortunately, our proposed Dream Cricket that was scheduled to take place had to be cancelled but maybe if the school restrictions ease, we will be able to conduct the event later this year. Dream Cricket is a Rotary project that encourages primary school students with a physical handicap to participate. When you see the expressions of excitement on their faces this is a very worthwhile exercise.

On the productive side, our May Street Park volunteers have done an excellent job in maintaining the park at a very high standard by mowing and whipper snipping on a regular basis.

During the year we partnered with Inverell Shire Council to assist in the development of the Lake Inverell Off-Road Recreation Track. This involved the club members, along with great assistance from the Danthonia Community, planting trees, shrubs and hedges. This, like the May Street Park, is a long-term project.

We have also partnered with the Pioneer Village Committee to maintain the Gournama Homestead building and the Gournama Cottage. This project involves cleaning the displays updating the information tags on the displays and the general cleaning of the buildings.

All in all we have had a reasonable number of projects to keep the members busy despite not being able to raise money. Fortunately the projects we have carried out have been cost free.

I thank all the members for their support in the projects we have undertaken over the past year.

I am happy to still be able to represent the club on the District Committee for this great program and managed to interview thirty two students online via Zoom one weekend.

The other program that ran was the Science and Engineering Challenge. It is run by the University of Newcastle and involves local high schools and Rotary volunteers.

I would like to thank President Paul for keeping the club together and moving forward in such challenging times. I am looking forward to working with incoming President Larry over the new Rotary year.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL/ ROTARY FOUNDATION

It has been a quiet year for International Service for all Rotary Clubs because of the Covid-19 Pandemic. Lack of International travel has hindered many of the International projects across the world. The good news is that Inverell East Rotary received a very complimentary letter and Certificate from Rotary International Foundation expressing the Foundation's appreciation of our support given over a number of years. There are 35,000 Rotary Clubs across the world and Inverell East was one of only 1,500 clubs to achieve **Top Three Highest in Per Capita Annual Giving**. While the Club donates money to the Foundation each year, the amount was greatly increased over the last two years, by the contribution of the 'Wild Billy Lids' who entertained at the Australia Café each Thursday for some time. Unfortunately, Covid-19 put an end to that activity. However, through judicial accounting and planning by our Board of Directors, we have still contributed \$1500 to the Foundation and \$1000 to each of Rotary Health and Shelter Box.

The Foundation is still working towards eradicating Polio across the world- only 2 countries are still to succeed. Most of the money donated to Rotary Health Australia goes into Medical Research. A priority area is currently Mental Health. Shelter Boxes are distributed in natural disaster regions and in Refugee Camps. These seem to be on the

increase rather than decreasing the way we would like.

Through the generous 'donations' from Club members, we have just raised over \$300 towards the RAWCS (Rotary Australia World Community Service) Projects. Some of our members in the past have participated in RAWCS projects in New Guinea, East Timor and Vanuatu, such as building classrooms and hospitals in these countries. Hopefully Covid will come under control in the near future so such programs can again operate.

Many thanks to all members for your support of the above programs. A special thanks to Paul for taking on the President's Role for a third time. You have done a sterling job Paul, in keeping our Club functioning under difficult circumstances. Good luck to Larry in taking on this role for the second time. I'm sure all members will support you Larry for the next Rotary Year.

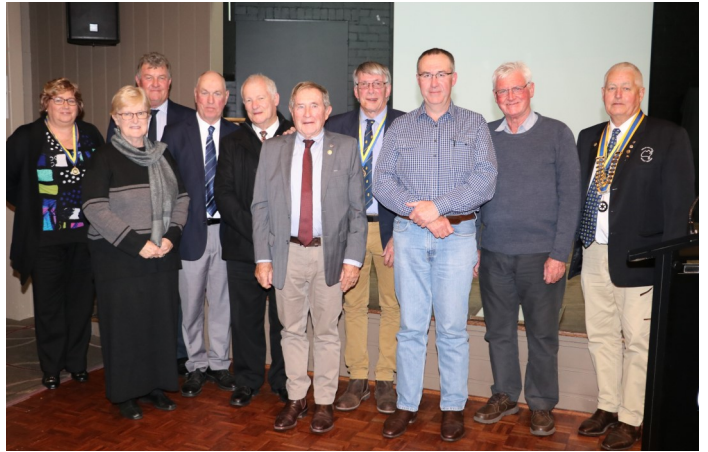

50 Years of Service

For 50 years the Rotary Club of Inverell East has contributed to communities at a local, district, national and international level. Chartered on July 16 1970, our club was sponsored by the late Keith Hopper and the late Stan Gunson from the Rotary Club of Inverell. There were 28 charter members and the first President was Mr Bevan Sommerlad. It is a pleasure to have Bevan at the 50th Golden Changeover. It is also a pleasure to have charter member Mr Ian McFarlane and Pattie as our guests.

A series of scrapbooks, kept by the late Harold Hamilton and preserved by Bill Gowlett, reveal the broad range of community activities and projects of this club during the first 30 years. These activities and projects were undertaken to support and improve the lives of our citizens and included a Palliative Care room at the Hospital, the purchase of surgical equipment, a playground for disabled children at Sinclair Place Special School, bowel cancer screening, building maintenance at McLean Aged Care, riverbank clearing and beautification and Pioneer Village work. There are far too many individuals involved to name specifically but suffice it to say that “Service Above Self” has not only been a motto for our club, but also a perfect reflection of the many hours of voluntary work that have gone towards the progress of our very own “Sapphire City”.

In the digital age of the 21st Century, much of our record-keeping over the past 20 years appears in the form of videos, flash drives, facebook and our club website. We still build, dig gardens, plant trees and operate a food van but in recent years much of our time and energy has gone into supporting local schools, Youth opportunities and planning, developing and implementing “event projects” which contribute directly to the social, cultural and sporting fabric of Inverell. Events such as the River Run, Copeton Freshwater Swim and the extremely popular Inverell’s Got Talent not only provide involvement and entertainment for many people but also raise funds which each year are disbursed by our club. Recipients include the Rotary Foundation, Rotary Health Research and people in need. Breast Cancer, Prostate Cancer, Westpac Helicopter, Volunteer Rescue Association, Salvation Army, Inner Wheel, Blaze Aid, drought relief, Pioneer Village – these are but a few of the groups and organizations which receive support from the Rotary Club of Inverell East.

In 2021, as we celebrate our 50th Changeover, our very first President, Bevan and charter member Ian would undoubtedly recognize that their legacy from earlier years has been respected, honoured and maintained. The traditions and practices established in the latter part of the 20th century have been preserved in a relentless and enthusiastic effort to pursue the ideals of Rotary International. We embrace the 4 Way Test and Object of Rotary and maintain the paramount importance of Service Above Self. I believe that Bevan and Ian and members past and present and partners should be proud to see that all the hard work, the dedication to local and international projects, the time and effort devoted to charitable fund-raising has not been in vain. The history of the Rotary Club of Inverell East is a proud one. Projects such as the May St Park and more recently the Cycle Track Beautification Project at Lake Inverell have been undertaken in partnership with our Inverell Shire Council. They will always remain as testimony to the efforts and service of our members and

friends. May the next 50 years of this proud, energetic and vigorous club continue in the same tradition.
