#### THE FOUR WAY TEST

Rotarians strive to apply the following test to the things they think, say or do:

- 1. Is it the TRUTH?
- 2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?
- 3. Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
- 4. Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?

#### Background

The Four Way Test was developed by Herbert J Taylor in July 1932 to be used as a measuring stick of the ethics of a company for which he was working. Herbert Taylor was a Rotarian and a President of Rotary International in 1954 - 1955.

For many decades Rotary Clubs and Rotarians have used the Four Way Test as an instrument to develop respect and understanding. The Four Way Test has also been used successfully around the world in business, government and schools as an effective measuring stick of conduct and a guide to 'right thinking'.

#### OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular to encourage and foster:

- FIRST The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- SECOND High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;
- THIRD The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;
- FOURTH The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

#### YOUTH

Our representative at NYSF this year was Inverell High School student, Anita Thivakon.

This year, NYSF was held as a mixture of online and face-to-face at the University of



Queensland (UQ) for a cohort of 451 Yr 12 students. Anita attended an Inverell East Rotary meeting in late February and gave a very comprehensive report to the membership about her time at NYSF which we all thoroughly enjoyed. Congratulations to Anita on her efforts at NYSF.

The Science and Engineering Challenge was again held in early March at the Inverell RSM Club. This is again focused on those STEM subjects, but for students in junior years of high school and upper primary school. They are

set a series of critical thinking challenges using STEM and a local winner is decided. We had over 180 students representing five high schools and two primary schools from around the district in attendance which is an outstanding effort. My thanks to Mr Simon Smith for his organisation and coordination of the challenge, in conjunction with Inverell Rotary Club and the facilitators from the University of Newcastle, as well as to the 8 of our members who volunteered to assist with activities on the day.

We have also partnered with Inverell High School Clontarf Academy, who are assisting us with maintaining the May Street Park. We thank the students and Director Mr Lindon McGrady for all their efforts.

I would like to express my sincere thanks and appreciation to outgoing President, Mr John Scoble, outgoing First Lady Mrs Ros Scoble, previous Youth Director Ms Julie Clendinning and Mr Simon Smith for all their assistance in my first year as Youth Director. I look forward to continuing in this role in the 2023 – 2024 Rotary year.

#### ROTARY INTERNATIONAL & ROTARY FOUNDATION

Rotary International / Rotary Foundation (People of Action).

Rotary causes are: Promoting peace, fighting disease, providing clean water, sanitation and hygiene, saving mothers and children, supporting education, growing local economies and protecting the environment.

Rotary is deeply concerned by the ongoing loss of life and the ongoing hardship suffered by the war in Ukraine. Rotary is providing aid through its response fund supplying aid to Ukrainian refugees and has supplied US\$15 million in grants that supply over 400 essential support activities.

2023 saw the devastating earthquakes in Syria and Türkiye that killed over 50 000 people and damaged 66 000 buildings. Rotary responded with disaster response grants encouraging Rotary clubs to support the relief efforts. Shelter Box helped 18 800 people in Türkiye where many people were made homeless in a bitter cold winter with tents, blankets, and clothing.

The End Polio Now campaign is still supported by the Bill and Melinda Gates foundation. Since September 2022 there have been no new wild cases of Polio in either

Afghanistan or Pakistan. Meaning that after 3 years have passed there are no new wild cases the world can be declared "Polio Free".

Rotary Foundation has many small ongoing projects each year striving to make life better for many people in developing countries and supplying humanitarian and disaster aid.

Inverell East Rotary supports the Rotary Foundation with our annual subscriptions and the awarding of Paul Harris Fellows.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank John Scoble for his leadership, guidance and hard work throughout this Rotary year.

#### **Geoffrey George South**

Sadly missed by family and friends, Geoff South was a stalwart of the Rotary Club of Inverell East from 1982 until 2021. During this time he selflessly served his community and in doing so, lived according to the motto of Rotary International – "Service Above Self". Geoff is remembered as a man who never sought recognition or reward. He was the ultimate 'behind the scenes' person. As a young man he served through organisations such as Jaycees, the Inverell Basketball



Association and the Department of Education's "Healthy Harold Van" Program which for many years visited local schools in support of the youth of our town. Geoff loved driving buses. He drove his fellow Rotarians on Magical Mystery Tours. He drove Rotary



overseas exchange students on trips around our country and he drove local kids to and from school.

Other activities that Geoff will be remembered for include his daredevil love of water skiing, the bagging of sheep manure to sell for fund raising, the laborious work involved in clearing and cleaning up the banks of the Macintyre River, the planting of trees in Butler St Park, involvement in the old Inverell Speedway and his dedicated, generous contribution to the formation of the now

famous National Transport Museum.

Throughout his distinguished membership of Inverell East (almost 40 years) Geoff preferred to steer clear of the trappings of office. Instead, he put his hand up for any job or project which he thought would benefit his club and community. In recent years he worked tirelessly at May St Park, the Lake Inverell Cycle Way, the Chip Van, the Sapphire City Festival, Inverell's Got Talent, The River Run, ANZAC Day and the Great





Duck Race to mention but a few. Geoff loved fellowship and a good laugh. He was happy to step up on stage at the Jenny Fox Fashion Parades and musical events. Along with his brother, Doug, he joined in to entertain audiences and raise funds for local charities. (He actually looked quite stunning in fishnet stockings).

Geoffrey George South was a family man, a friend, a helper of other people. He was a good man, a great Rotarian. We will miss him.

#### **Jock Gartshore**

Sadly missed by family and friends and fellow Rotarians, Jock Gartshore was a member of Inverell East from November 2012 until May 2021. During this time, he made new friends, met up with old ones and contributed to his local community through Rotary service. Jock's skills as a builder were put to good use as he helped with various club projects such as the May St Park. Working alongside volunteers from our club and Inverell High, he played a



valuable role in the construction of the park shelters and the on-site fence and gates.



Jock was proud of his Scottish heritage and enjoyed the friendly banter at our dinner meetings when the Fine Sergeant made the occasional reference to kilts (yes or no?), noisy bagpipes and haggis. Born in Ayr, Scotland (1939) Jock and his family migrated to Australia when he was twelve. They settled in Warialda and Jock began his building apprenticeship with George Ford at the age of sixteen. In his early days as a builder Jock worked with Geoff South who was a plasterer. They later shared membership of Inverell East. Jock was a very talented sportsman and in 1964 moved to Parkes to pursue his

Rugby League career. He won Premierships, played Firsts and Seconds for NSW

Country and did some coaching for Country teams. In 2008 he was honoured by being named in the "Team of the Century" for Rugby League Group 5 (now Group 19).

After his marriage in 1967, Jock and Laraine raised their family in Wamberal on the NSW Central Coast where they continued their building business. Returning to live in Inverell in 2002, Jock and Laraine were introduced to Rotary by Derrick and Pat Yee and after Jock's induction to the club in 2012 they enjoyed many social functions and outings with Inverell East. Jock served the club and Inverell until suffering a























